Ms Noreen John worked as Adviser in the General Technical Assistance Division for almost two decades starting 1990s.

• I've just heard of the untimely passing of Noreen John in Dominica, after an illness.

Before joining ComSec, I knew Noreen from CAFRA (Caribbean Association for Feminist Research and Action), a regional feminist organization of which she was a member; and SPAT (Small Projects Assistance Team), a progressive development NGO in Dominica, at which she worked.

She was also Dominica's National Representative on CAFRA's regional body. And she led the organization of a CAFRA national group in Dominica, organized around a "Women in Caribbean Agriculture" research/action project.

We were also friends and colleagues at ComSec. She was the Gender Focal Point (GFP) of her Division (GTASD), and was very involved in collaborating with the Gender Section.

In 2013, while doing some work in Dominica, I saw her often at Government meetings as well as informally, including visiting her home in Grand Bay. She was the (then) Director of Legal Aid, and was very involved in supporting the work of the Government's Gender Bureau. SIR ALISTER MCINTYRE

(1930-2019)



Sir Alister McIntyre, former Chancellor of the University of West Indies and a distinguished economist, served on many Commonwealth and international investigations into the economies of small member states. He was a good friend of the Commonwealth and someone who contributed a good deal to it.

• Others in the Secretariat and wider Commonwealth family will have known Sir Alister over a long period and will be acquainted with his major contributions to Caribbean, Commonwealth and international development.

One of his less well-known contributions to the Commonwealth was his chairmanship, when Vice-Chancellor of the University of the West Indies, of the Third Ten-Year Review of the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan in 1993. This was the context in which for a short time I worked closely with him, as Director of Education.

It was indeed a brief experience but one that leaves the most vivid memories. Some are of Alister mastering his brief and chairing the review group with charm and consummate skill. Even more I recall the friendly and unassuming manner in which he befriended Secretariat staff of all grades and his readiness to focus exclusively on the job in hand for several days in succession, apparently laying aside his other preoccupations. He rolled up his sleeves, sat with us late into the evening - cheap takeaways instead of the posh hotel dinners he could have been enjoying - for two or three evenings in succession in our extremely unappealing Quadrant House office accommodation until a good draft report, bearing the stamp of his own personal insights, was complete. It is only now, incidentally, 25 years later, that some of the Group's best ideas about purposefully linking Scholarships with the Commonwealth key policy concerns are seeing the light of day. That short encounter with Alister brought home to me how admirable a role model he was and how fortunate must have been those who served with, and learnt from, him over long periods. Peter Williams

• As a rather belated follow-up to Peter Williams' comments on the late Sir Alister McIntyre, perhaps I can add a little regarding Sir Alister's interaction with the Economic Affairs Division. This followed the 1975 CHOGM's decision to set up a small group of experts "to draw up a comprehensive and interrelated programme of practical measures directed at closing the gap between rich and poor countries", with Sir Alister as Chairman. It resulted in about half a dozen of us in EAD working closely with him during the subsequent two years, especially at Expert Group meetings in Ottawa, London and Ibadan. In many ways this Group set the template and was among the first of over half a dozen groups of experts serviced by EAD during the next fifteen or so years. Its report was important in setting the agenda for what became known in the UN as the 'New International Economic Order.'

I believe I can say that we in EAD always found Sir Alister to have shown astute leadership, an enduring capacity for sustained hard work, a great grasp of technical detail, and a friendly and amiable disposition towards those of us who serviced his Group and otherwise came into contact with him.
