### TUNKU ABDUL AZIZ (1934-2023)



**Tunku Abdul Aziz** was the Director of Administration at ComSec from about 1985-1992. He was a Malaysian corporate figure, activist and politician who went on to hold numerous high profile positions in the global anti-corruption movement. He also served as vice-chairman of the board of directors of Transparency International.

Once back home in Malaysia and involved in the Democratic Action Party (and in the Senate), his voice and his commitment to principle seemed to have grown ever stronger. That tenacity of purpose doesn't seem to have included the Commonwealth, if his scathing (if exhilarating) 'New Straits Times' article, of 2007, is anything to go by. And yet his issues were, are and should be the Commonwealth's too and, I for one, salute someone who only latterly emerged a champion and who in the process achieved a great deal. Stuart Mole

Only a witty string of cricketing metaphors about going into bat on a sticky wicket enabled him by creating gales of laughter to partially appease, and win the warm friendship of, his disgruntled colleagues an episode Peter Brooke frequently recalled with pleasure in House of Lords debates on the Commonwealth.

Peter Marshall himself certainly played a long and invaluable innings for the Commonwealth both as DSG in charge of economic affairs, and as our CW Association President and I know we are all conscious of the huge debt of gratitude we owe him - which others will be able to voice more authoritatively than I. **Peter Williams** 

While we knew that Peter's health had become very fragile, this is immensely sad news.What an amazing person Peter was - an archetypal British diplomat, silverhaired and silver-tongued, but one who, once recruited by Sonny Ramphal into the Commonwealth, became one of the association's stoutest and most enduring advocates. Peter was a cerebral and amiable colleague at the Commonwealth Secretariat from 1983 to 1988 when we were both Sonny Ramphal's Deputy Secretaries-General, he in charge of economic affairs and I of political affairs and Administration. He had an unusual capacity for presenting complex economic issues in simple and elegant prose. And he demonstrated a remarkable transition from being a long-dedicated diplomat of one member country (UK) to an equally dedicated representative of the multinational Commonwealth.

Peter continued in many brilliant articles his advocacy of the Commonwealth's inherent value and services to its members and the wider global community long after leaving Marlborough House and until his dying days. A recent example of his activism in championing the Commonwealth was his fervent support for the joint demarche by the former Commonwealth Secretaries-General to the University of London authorities when the Institute of Commonwealth Studies was threatened with closure. He was an effective advocate at the lunch I hosted in honour of the Vice Chancellor to discuss the affairs of the Institute.

Many of Peter's writings on the Commonwealth, the United Nations and Cricket are a treasure. It is perhaps of some comfort that he passed away peacefully while watching a game of cricket, a sport he loved.

- Everyone involved with the Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative is saddened by news of Neville's death for, after he left the Secretariat, he played an active part in trying to promote human rights in the Commonwealth. This was after the Harare Declaration, when there were still military dictatorships and one party states in the membership, and a particularly hateful dictator, Sani Abacha, ruled Nigeria.

In 1995, a three person team from the CHRI spent a fortnight in Nigeria and produced a telling report, "Nigeria – Stolen by Generals" which was influential in the run up to the Auckland CHOGM. Following the execution of Ken Saro-Wiwa and other Ogoni leaders, Nigeria was suspended from the councils of the Commonwealth and the summit set up the Commonwealth Ministerial Action Group. Both of these steps were important firsts for a voluntary body which had been more willing to talk about democracy and human rights than to discipline members which ignored them.

The CHRI team was led by Flora McDonald, former Foreign Minister of Canada, along with Enoch Dumbutshena, respected former Chief Justice of Zimbabwe, and

Neville, who was secretary to the mission and drafted its report. A photo of caged children on the cover movingly illustrated the loss of rights for all Nigerians at that time.

Subsequently Neville led another CHRI group to Zambia, when concerns were widespread that democracy had not been consolidated after the end of Kaunda's one party rule. Although this work did not have the impact of his Nigerian report it may be significant to compare the continuance of democracy in Zambia today with its failures in neighbouring Zimbabwe. Neville was active as a member of the London board for many years, and continued to support CHRI after he lost his sight. All who knew him are sad he is no longer with us. **Richard Bourne**
