(-2016)

Mr Mohinder Puri served in the Commonwealth Secretariat from 1973 to 2001 in a variety of divisions: Economic Affairs, Commonwealth Youth Programme (CYP), Food Production and Rural Development, the CYP Centre in Chandigarh (India), and with the General Technical Assistance Division which eventually became the Governance and Institutional Development Division (GIDD) where he was Chief Programme Officer.

Ms Elmin Boyce worked as a switchboard operator. Her Bajan lilt always filled a room, especially the Friday night bar.

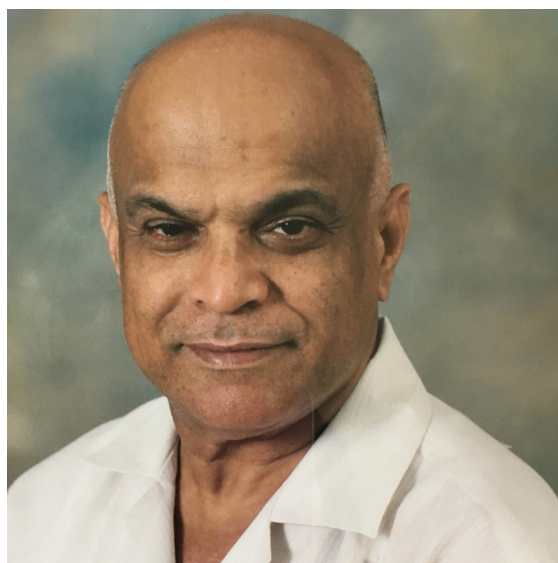
- *May her soul rest in perfect peace. **Sallay Williams***

(1933-2016)



Professor Bishnodat Persaud, Director, Economic Affairs Division, and Chief Economic Adviser to the Commonwealth Secretary-General from 1982-92. Professor Persaud worked at the Commonwealth Secretariat from 1974 before he was appointed Director.
